Positive start for Police Scotland

Lothian and Borders Police became part of Scotland's unitary police service Police Scotland on 1 April

INSPECTOR MARK RENNIE of Drylaw Police Station met with NEN to outline some of the more visible changes:

"Police in North Edinburgh have experienced a positive start to Police Scotland. We're now a far bigger team as we can access a whole load of help and assistance from across the country. Already the Police Scotland helicopter has been hovering over our area and we've had specialist officers from Glasgow helping us to carry out work to tackle antisocial behaviour and violence.

A lot of work is being done on a daily basis to tackle underlying violence, whether that happens in the street or "Members of the public have appreciated the extra street presence and efforts being made to keep them safe"

within the home. We're also seeing a positive impact from the creation of the Domestic Abuse Investigation Unit which has ensured that all domestic incidents are thoroughly investigated and a range of appropriate measures are put in place to ensure the safety of the victim.

Importantly, we have also been provided with local Twitter accounts, so by following: @edinnorthpolice local people can get daily updates in relation to ongoing police activity in the area and our response to local crimes.

Campaign Against Violence One area of particular note has been the days organised around our Campaign Against Violence (CAV) which have seen office based staff coming to work in areas to help officers tackle some of their ongoing problems. To date, four of these days have been run out of Drylaw Police Station, resulting in an extra eighty officers patrolling the streets and walkways to deter crime and violence. The CAV days have not only made an impact on crime but also been very well received by members of the public who have appreciated the extra street presence and efforts being made to keep them safe.

All in all it's been a really positive start and over the coming months we will keep everyone up to date through our direct contact with the community and also via our Twitter account and local media".

NORTH EDINBURGH ACTIVIST Brian Robertson passed away on 17 May. Former ice cream man Brian Robertson was a doting father, a big Hearts fan and an Elvis fanatic who cared deeply about the North Edinburgh community and social justice. He was a committed community activist for many years, always willing to get involved in campaigns and battles – Brian didn't believe in too many meetings and 'talking shops', although over the years he must have attended more than most.

A founding member of Greater Pilton's Community Alliance, Brian was at his best when he was doing things, not just talking about doing things: he was never afraid to speak out, whether as a school board Chair opposed to closures and PPP or about the inherent unfairness of fuel poverty or the Fairer Scotland Fund. Most recently, despite poor health, Brian was proud to be an active and enthusiastic member of the North Edinburgh Social History Group. He absolutely believed that the area's proud story of protest and activism had to be told to a wide audience, particularly to encourage a new generation of younger activists to take up the fight. Among other achievements the group produced the excellent 'Never Give Up' book – and those three words sum up wee Brian's attitude to community activism to a tee.

Children's Minister praises Circle Scotland

THE WORK being carried out by Circle Scotland was praised by Aileen Campbell, the Minister for Children and Young People, during a recent visit to the Pilton-based project. Ms Campbell also announced details of £10 million Strategic Partnership Funding for voluntary sector organisations working with children and families.

Families across Scotland will benefit from better support services with 45 third sector organisations receiving a funding boost from the Scottish Government. This £10 million of Strategic Partnership Funding will strengthen the work of young people's organisations working across Scotland, in areas such as adoption, vulnerable families, child health, literacy, bereavement counselling and parental support.

Minister for Children and Young People Aileen Campbell said: "We are working to make Scotland the best place in the world to grow up, including increasing the level of free early learning and childcare through the Children and Young People Bill, which will save families equivalent to around £700 per child. Scottish families already benefit from a wide range of support and the organisations receiving a share of this £10 million will help to improve what is on offer. Thanks to our investment, great organisations like Circle, which I am visiting today, will be able to take their work further into the community, helping families in need across Scotland get access to the right information and resources."

Funding of £20 million through the Third Sector Early Intervention Fund and £10 million through Strategic Funding Partnerships was announced last month.

The College ploughs ahead

Edinburgh College lends support to ground breaking community farm initiative

EDINBURGH COLLEGE has shown its support for a community-owned farm in the Borders by becoming the first College to become a shareholder. As part of Edinburgh College's commitment to sustainability, the College has invested in Whitmuir Farm's new share scheme, which allows local people and organisations to get actively involved in the running of a modern day farm in Scotland.

Whitmuir Farm, one of Scotland's most innovative organic farms, will use the support from the College and other shareholders to help to establish the farm as a national resource on sustainable food and farming, which will include a "green classroom" for students to learn about local and ethical food.

The farm also hopes to establish discovery trails, exhibitions, educational opportunities and citizen science projects, whilst also looking out for the next generation of farmers to train and nurture.

Harriet Cross, Sustainability Projects Co-ordinator at Edinburgh College, said: "We are delighted to be supporting such a fantastic farming initiative. The College really supports the values of Whitmuir Farm and believe in its vision for local, ethical and sustainable food. We have a strong relationship with Whitmuir Farm through our veggie bag scheme. Each week, a group of our Bridging Course students visit the farm to sort, weigh and bag organic vegetables which they then deliver to staff and student customers at the College. The students not only gain practical work experience at the farm and improve their enterprise and numeracy skills but they also gain an understanding of where their food comes from."

Harriet added:"We are constantly looking for innovative ways to engage students and staff with sustainability across the College, and we are really pleased to continue to strengthen our relationship with Whitmuir Farm through the farm share initiative."

Heather Anderson, member of the Steering Group for the Community Farm said: "We are so delighted to receive this kind of support. It's good to know we are selling the farm to people who really care about the land and what we do here. This ensures we continue to enjoy a real, long term relationship with the College and the young people who go there into the future."

The farm has also launched a ground breaking bio-char project, which Edinburgh College students will be undertaking as an offshoot project at the Milton Road Community Garden. By carrying out a growing trial, the students will be able to monitor the effects of burnt woody waste on plant life in the garden, which may have a significant bearing on how the organic food is grown.



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Stramullion Service celebrates ten years at West Pilton Park

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ROWAN ALBA chief executive Helen Carlin and project manager Sue Evans were joined by staff, supporters and service users past and present at a reception to celebrate the tenth birthday of the organisation's homeless women's unit in North Edinburgh last month. Local MP Mark Lazarowicz was among the guests who gathered to mark the important milestone at West Pilton Neighbourhood Centre.

Rowan Alba's Stramullion Service in West Pilton was established in 2003 in partnership with the City of Edinburgh Council to provide secure short-term supported accommodation for up to ten women and their children in individual flats. Stramullion works with women aged 16+, with and without children, who are homeless – this includes young people who are in transition (for example, leaving care), women whose families have broken down, and those involved in offending, or alcohol or drug misuse.

Stramullion staff provide advice and support to enable each woman to build the personal skills and resources they need – equipping them to move on from homelessness in a positive and healthy way. Each personal support plan depends on individual circumstances and need, and just some of the core services which many Stramullion clients

- need include:
- Welfare and benefits advice
- Budget and debt management
- Life skills training and home management
 Tenancy maintenance support
- Resettlement and social activities
- Advice, information and support to access local community services

- Referral to specialist social work, health and counselling services
- Help with applications and grants
- Move on support when the time comes to move in to their own home
- A follow-up service after re-settlement.

The Stramullion (an old Scots word for 'strong woman') service believes that accommodation, support, education and employment provide women with the best route off the streets and out of the misery caused by homelessness.

Speaking at the anniversary event, Rowan Alba CEO Helen Carlin said: "I'm really delighted to be celebrating ten years in partnership with City of Edinburgh Council and all our supporters. I'm especially pleased to see so many current and past service users turning out to celebrate with us."

Stramullion project manager Sue Evans, who has been at West Pilton since day one, added: "This is a very special day for us and it's great to see so many people here. It's really brilliant!"



CAMPAIGN IS SUNK

Council pulls the plug on Leith Waterworld

CITY COUNCILLORS voted to accept a £1m bid to convert Leith Waterworld into a soft play area, only months after agreeing to work with local campaigners to reopen the leisure pool as a community enterprise. Campaign group Splashback said they felt 'brutally betrayed' by the council decision.

Leith Waterworld closed in January last year, but the campaign group Splashback has campaigned to have the popular facility reopened as a community asset ever since. The group felt they might be on the verge of success when councillors voted to support a feasibility study earlier this year – and council officers have even been working alongside the Splashback group to firm up proposals.

However campaigners were concerned when news of an alternative bid from Glasgowbased A&G Property Group emerged and Splashback's worst fears were realised at the 30 May council meeting.

Councillors voted to accept A&G Property Group's offer to purchase Leith Waterworld for £1m. A & G say they will spend around £1.3m on refurbishing the building and that over eighty jobs will be created in the local area.

Councillor Richard Lewis, the city's Culture and Sport Convener, said: "This has been a very difficult decision and one that this Council does not take lightly. Firstly I'd like to thank Splashback for the work and commitment they have demonstrated in progressing the community bid. However this coalition feels that the potential purchaser will create a high quality leisure facility that will greatly benefit the community in Leith and the wider Edinburgh area.

"In recognition of Splashback's commitment to creating affordable and accessible swimming opportunities for young people in the community, we're commiting £125,000 towards free swimming for primary aged children in Edinburgh. "Ultimately this option ensures that the community in Leith has an accessible leisure facility for many years to come, that swimming opportunities are available and also that the Council gets best value for the taxpayers of Edinburgh."

In a statement following the council's decision, Splashback campaigners said: "We are infuriated and dismayed that City of Edinburgh Councillors today pulled the plug on Leith Waterworld for good. We have spent 15 months campaigning to save the pool, and four months working intensively with Council officers and elected members to develop the business plan for a revived pool. Yet they have abandoned their commitment to work with us and today put a price on public trust – sold for \pounds_1 million.

In the January amendment, Councillors agreed to support a feasibility stage until December 2013 and committed £125,000 towards this, with a further £225,000 over two years if the plan was successful. This decision was against officers' recommendations and seemed to indicate that Councillors had a genuine desire to work cooperatively with the city's residents. This could have been a flagship project for community engagement. In chambers on 31 January, Richard Lewis said: 'We owe it to the people of Edinburgh to do everything to preserve this valuable community asset'. The trust we placed in the council that day has been brutally betrayed. Significant progress had been made through the working group: we applied for charitable status; tenders for engineering, design and consultancy services had been issued and positive contact made with potential funders, who were excited about the project. Despite this progress, our work has been prematurely cut short. There has been no chance for a fair comparison between the commercial property deal agreed today, and our case for a community-led, revitalised Waterworld.

The bid accepted today is a poor result for Leith, for families, children, the disabled or the local community. Losing this unique and much loved fun pool is an utter tragedy for the city – such infrastructure is unlikely ever to be replaced. Soft play delivers none of the health and wellbeing benefits of swimming. What's more, the bid accepted today will bring none of the additional positive social impacts of the renewed Waterworld we proposed, such as a sense of community cohesion, volunteer and training opportunities, and precious family time together in the water.

The capital sorely lacks adequate provision of affordable, accessible family swimming. In the last 48 hours, we have pressed Councillors to address this problem by ring-fencing the £125,000 they had promised us in January. We believe this funding should be used to secure free swimming for the city's under 11s, as a minimum. Though the programme proposed in today's motion in no way compensates for the loss of Waterworld, it will hopefully help encourage more families to swim.

Heartbroken

We are heartbroken that we have not been able to save the pool, despite our best efforts. We know this will be deeply felt by many across the city. We would like to thank everyone for your overwhelming support for the campaign."

Commenting on the council's decision to sell Leith Waterworld, Lothian Green MSP Alison Johnstone said: "This decision sends the worst possible message to communities trying to come together to protect services and improve facilities in their area. Despite all the warm words we hear on community empowerment and people power, when a developer comes along with a wad of cash, community efforts seem to count for little."

She went on: "Families in Leith and right across the city made it very clear that they valued Waterworld as a unique leisure pool, and just five months after giving everyone hope that it would reopen, the Council have pulled the plug and campaigners will be feeling totally gutted."



Living memories of adventures in Leith

A BOOK which recounts the memories of eight auld Leithers was launched earlier this month. 'An Adventure! – Happy Days in Leith' has been produced by the Citadel Arts Group and tells the stories of residents of Port of Leith Housing Association's (PoLHA) St Nicholas Court Sheltered Housing Complex.

A 3 June launch event saw musician Laure Paterson entertaining residents and a class of Trinity Primary School pupils who called in to join the celebrations and bring the generations together.

PoLHA's Maureen Tait, who manages the St Nicholas Court complex, said: "It is nice for the children and staff to hear stories of the past from the tenants and tales of things that we'll never experience. The children are so good, always polite and helpful. It means a lot to the tenants here."

'An Adventure! – Happy Days in Leith' is a collection of memories about childhood, school days, first work experiences and family life collected by Citadel Arts Group living memory workers, Laure C Paterson and Liz Hare.

The book features St Nicholas Court residents Rita Falconer, Bertha Glancy, Margaret McKinlay, Annie Mulvaney, Mary McNicol, May Stevenson, Jean Tait and Frances Veitch - each of whom shared their memories of Leith past and present with the book's authors. Margaret said: "Things have changed a lot over the years and it's been great to share those stories".

The book is the culmination of seven weeks of sharing, recording and transcribing the stories of the eight residents. Citadel Arts Group's Liz Hare said: "The tenants generously shared their memories and we have collected them into this book which will be a resource for the whole community. Each member of the project will receive two copies and copies will go into Trinity Primary and local libraries. It has been one of the most enjoyable projects we have been involved in." The project is funded by The

Robertson Trust.



Housing Minister welcomes Varcity North tenants

"The initiative has been hugely successful, with deals secured with 13 developers to deliver over 1000 high quality homes for families throughout Scotland at very little cost to the taxpayer. A vibrant, expanding housing sector stimulates growth and protects and creates jobs in the construction sector and wider economy." David Knight, Managing Director, Miller Homes Scotland said: "We are delighted to bring the midmarket rental homes to market slightly ahead of schedule. Securing affordable housing in Edinburgh remains difficult and the challenging lending environment also means that buying is still out of reach for some households.

"The 89 apartments will go some way to helping those in employment secure an affordable rental tenancy. The apartments are developed to Miller Homes' high standards of the quality of the build, fixtures and fittings and will form part of vibrant, modern development, which is quickly establishing its own sense of community.

"Because of that huge diversity, where once we could look at education as a triangle – with the school, the parents and the pupil as the three sides – the triangle has had to develop a fourth side, with partnerships as that fourth side. As the inspiration film has shown, your support and encouragement has made such a huge difference to these young people. Thank you."

Growing Support

Minister pledges support to local Grow Your Own Working Group during Drylaw visit

SCOTLAND'S GROWING GROW Your Own movement was given extra support by Rural Affairs Secretary Richard Lochhead during a visit to Drylaw Neighbourhood Centre last month. The minister was impressed by the Centre's Drylaw and Telford Community Gardens project, and after meeting some enthusiastic volunteers Mr Lochhead endorsed the workings of the Grow Your Own Working Group.

Made possible through Climate Challenge Funding, Drylaw's community gardens project has now been running for three years and like the healthiest of plants - has continued to thrive. From small beginnings the project has flourished and now encompasses two orchards and vegetable and flower beds at Drylaw Neighbourhood Centre, along with a number of patches of once unused and unwanted across the area which have been transformed. And it's not only flowers and vegetables that have flourished - the number of volunteers involved in the gardening project has grown too, and the group has supported te development of gardening projects at nearby Ferryhill and Rowanfield schools.

Richard Lochhead met Centre staff and volunteers to talk about the project before going on to plant some tatties with Brendan and Brandon, two green-fingered helpers from Rowanfield School. He also met members of the Centre's enthusiastic gardening group who proudly displayed their recently-created willow tunnel.

The Minister said: "There are so many benefits to projects like this one, and I am really very encouraged and impressed by what I've seen in Drylaw today. It's been great to see the contribution of the staff and the enthusiasm of the volunteers and it would be great to see these ideas replicated all over Scotland. I've also learned some posh new recipe ideas from some of the young volunteers, so well done to everyone involved!"

Consultation launch

Mr Lochhead's support for community initiatives like Drylaw Community Gardens follows the launch of a consultation on simplifying and overhauling Scotland's allotment rules, and there are three meetings taking place for people to air their views – in Inverness, Glasgow and Edinburgh. Twenty seven recommendations were made in a report from the Grow Your Own Working Group (GYOWG) that covered six key themes: planning, legal, skills, community land, guidance and funding. The GYOWG has been working collaboratively with the Scottish Government and other partners to deliver these recommendations.

Mr Lochhead said: "More and more people are looking to get their hands dirty by getting back to nature and growing their own food. Growing your own food allows people to eat the fruits of their own labour and understand where their food comes from – a topic which is high on the agenda at the moment.

David Jamieson, Chair of the Grow Your Own Working Group, said: "The wonderful garden in Drylaw is an excellent example of a community making the most of their local space to get active and grow food. We are delighted that Mr Lochhead is able to see for himself the fruits of their labour, and really pleased that the Scottish Government is doing so much to encourage communities across Scotland to do likewise."

Cammy Day is vice-convener of the city council's Health and Wellbeing Committee as well as being a member of Drylaw's management committee. He said: "The health benefits associated with community growing include providing exercise in the open air – exercise which we can take at our own pace and therefore suitable for all ages; it helps to relieve stress and is of proven benefit to mental health and wellbeing. Locally produced food also contributes to healthy eating and helps to combat the risks of obesity and sedentary lifestyles. It also helps to reduce our carbon footprint, so contributes in a small way to the battle against climate change."

He added: "The Community garden project has been a great success and it's been a real community initiative that's gone from strength to strength. I'd like to thank Roy (Douglas) and the staff and management committee at Drylaw Neighbourhood Centre, particularly Elizabeth (Graham) and her team of volunteers for all the hard work and effort they have put in."

Jason Rust, also a city councillor, is legal adviser to Scottish Land & Estates. He added: "We are keen to see partnership working with public, private and community landowners making further land available for allotment sites and community growing spaces, and for awareness of the range of advantages to be increased. Drylaw is a great example of what can be achieved."

Dream big, Dream Fierce

Spartans volunteers head out to Tanzania

A TEAM of Spartans Community Football Academy volunteers head out to Africa on the journey of a lifetime this month. Three staff and a senior volunteer will join nine young people to spend two weeks working with a support project in Tanzania.

"Our patron Gordon Strachan hosted a very successful charity dinner last year, which raised an incredible amount of money. That has enabled us to do a lot of things here at the Academy, including our extension, but it has also given us the opportunity to send a small group from Spartans to help in a project in Tanzania", explained Kenny Cameron, who is Community Programme Manager at Spartans Community Football Academy.

"We have links with a very successful Edinburghbased charity called YES (Youth Empowerment through Sport) Tanzania. Their aims and objectives are very similar to our own, and in the past we have sent footballs, strips and boots over there. But now, thanks to the support of some very generous supporters – and the brilliant fundraising efforts of the Spartan Army volunteers themselves – we can take a small group over there to help out.

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"The guys will have a very full programme over the two weeks – delivering Young Leader training and a coaching education programme, visiting schools and an orphanage. They will also spend some time in a shanty town and will see first hand the grinding poverty of daily life in what is one of the poorest nations on earth. As you can imagine the facilities are not great in Arusha, where the pilot project is based, so in time we also hope to build a football pitch and fund their development worker post for a year – we can make a real difference."

Although the Spartans team have a very busy schedule they won't be working non-stop and they have a real treat to look forward to.

"We have built in an overnight safari as part of the trip. It's our way of saying thanks to these young people – who all live locally - who have given up a lot of hours of their own time over two and three years to volunteer here with us. It will be an amazing experience, the adventure of a lifetime", Kenny went on.

"Our motto this year is 'Dream Big, Dream Fierce' and the Tanzanian experience kind of sums that up - who would have thought that a wee group of young folk from





North Edinburgh could travel halfway across the world and make a difference to peoples' lives there? The message we are trying to convey to everyone who comes into contact with the Community Football Academy is: Believe – anything can be achieved.

"Tanzania will be an experience our volunteers will never forget, and the hope is that they will pass on what they learned there and share their experiences when they get back to North Edinburgh, inspiring the next generation of Spartan Army volunteers".
