CONFERENCE REPORT

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'Our community has some great resources, and chief among these is our people: the activists and the volunteers, young and old. This important conference will discuss what our community needs – and work out how, together, we can get where we want to be.' – CONFERENCE INVITATION

Foreword

The Community Conference was organised to give local people an opportunity to air their views about our community – what works, what doesn't, what needs to change and what can WE do, working with others, to change it?

Community organisation Granton Improvement Society had also been planning to hold a Spring conference, so we decided to join forces to organise the event and we were then joined by Craigroyston Community High School's Community Centre team. The conference steering group, as it became, agreed the programme for the day and put in a lot of effort to ensure the conference was a success.

We were delighted to be joined by Professor Oliver Escobar, lecturer in Public Policy at Edinburgh University and co-director of *What Works Scotland*, who kindly gave his time to help guide us through a busy programme on the day.

The biggest thanks to all, however, goes to the local people who also gave up their own time to help to try to make our community a better place to be. Without them, there would have been no point in holding the conference.

Everything CAN does is based on two principles. One: this community's greatest asset is the people who live here - the activists and volunteers, the youthful enthusiasts and the experienced die-hards who have seen it and done it all before.

And Two: the people who know best what an area really needs are the people who live there – the folk who don't go away at the end of the working day.

The people who attended the conference did so because they care about this community. This was **their** conference, and was all about harnessing their ideas, their energy, their commitment and tapping into their local knowledge.

We said at the outset that the event would not provide all the answers and that the conference is simply the first step on a journey. But it's an important first step, and the local community will now determine the path we will follow.

DAVE PICKERING (CAN, on behalf of Conference Steering Group)

Setting the scene:

The Community Conference was organised by Community Action North (CAN) and Granton Improvement Society with the support of Craigroyston Community Centre at Craigroyston Community High School.

Purpose of the event:

The conference was organised to give local people the opportunity to discuss the challenges facing the North Edinburgh community, look at possible new opportunities and to agree a plan of action to address these issues.

Publicity and Advertising:

The conference was advertised through social media, posters, flyers and by invitation through North Edinburgh's community organisations email networks. Leaflets were also distributed in the Muirhouse and West Pilton areas and bare walls in Muirhouse Shopping Centre were chalk-painted to publicise the event.

Attendees:

Fifty-six people took part in the conference (see Appendix A).

Registration/Welcome/Introductions:

After registration, delegates were asked to note what they think are the three biggest issues facing North Edinburgh.

CAN's Dave Pickering and Craigroyston's Vanessa Cousins welcomed attendees and Professor Oliver Escobar set the scene and explained the days' agenda.

CAN's Andy Dalzell and Granton Improvement Society's Willie Black then gave presentations on 'Community Assets, Challenges and Opportunities'.

These contributions led into the first workshop/breakout session.

Breakout Session One: What Issues are most important for North Edinburgh?

Working with facilitators, delegates split into work groups to discuss what they feel are the most important issues for the community. All comments and ideas were recorded (see Appendices B & C).

Each group then reported their findings back to conference.

Conference organisers looked at both the points recorded on the 'sticky wall' and issues raised during the first breakout period and grouped them under five headings:

- Economy, power & decision-making (aka The Big Picture)
- Crime and Community Safety
- Housing
- Young People
- Community Spaces & Infrastructure

These headings formed the basis for the formation for the afternoon session and new Action Groups.



Breakout Session 2: What is our vision for the future?

Oliver Escobar recapped the issues raised during the first session and explained that the topics identified there would lead the discussions in the second session. We have identified the main issues - what can we do about them in the short term, medium term and longer term?

The groups discussed the issues in more detail and faciltators move on from table to table to ensure a wide spectrum of opinion was gathered. Group spokespersons then fed back to the main conference before lunch.



Workshop/Breakout Session 3: How does each Action Group achieve our vision for each issue?

After lunch delegates were invited to join the most appropriate Action Group for them: they were also encouraged to sign up for all groups in which they have an interest, for although they could only participate in one of the Action Groups in the afternoon session there will be opportunities to be involved in more Action Groups as they develop.

This was the key session of the day: we had the issues, we had some ideas on how to address them and now it was time to come up with practical steps to help us to get where we want to be. Also, what other groups and agencies should we be working with to make things happen?

Groups were also asked to appoint a convener(s) to coordinate and progress the respective Action Group plan.

Each Action Group then presented their findings and ideas to the conference.
