CRIME

You are probably aware of the recent attack on the corner shop in South Trinity Road we all simply call "Joe's". All of us, and especially the many residents who sent cards and flowers to Joe, will be pleased to know that he is back from hospital and while still stitched, stiff and sore, is already back at his shop. We wish him the speediest recovery to full health.

Police are treating this as attempted murder so it should receive the highest level of attention possible. We will be keeping a close eye on the investigation as it develops. One side effect of this dreadful act is to highlight just how important our local shops are to our community and what a lifeline (not to mention grapevine) they are for many, especially the elderly. There have been several attacks in recent years, not just on "Joe's" but also on "Johnstone's".

Likewise the bin blazes which took place earlier in the "summer" were a reckless act which, had they got out of hand, could have been life-threatening. What can we do? Well, keeping an eye open for suspicious behaviour and reporting it is probably a start. Call 101 or 999 depending on how imminent the threat seems.

LOCAL RETAIL

From RBS and TSB closure to Sainsbury's opening there's a lot happening to our local retailers. We have contacted Bank of Scotland at the highest level suggesting that with the closure of that competition, the opportunity exists to supply an enhanced service to local traders by increasing opening hours. Unfortunately it doesn't appear that Bank of Scotland is prepared to do that.

RISING IN THE EAST....

Earlier this year CEC approved extension of the Edinburgh Tramline to Newhaven in principle. The cost has been put at £114m. TCC's thoughts have been sought and regular readers will know our concern about the lack of strategic thinking on east-west transport across all North Edinburgh. You may also recall a recent item mentioning the synergies which a tram link to Ocean Terminal would bring. We are therefore inclined to support this as offering improved travel infrastructure to Trinity but realise it has been controversial. Do you have a view? EVEN EASIER WAY TO MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Waterfront Edinburgh Limited is currently producing a new outline planning application for the waterfront. While this lies in Granton rather than Trinity we believe it is in the interests of the entire neighbourhood that the quality of redevelopment is high. History and green space matter to a community and without those things, the result could be a soulless and troubled place.

Granton's 'lost' Mediaeval Castle Garden has potential as a focus for the redevelopment rather than simply turning it over to yet more housing. For the people of Trinity, it would offers a unique place to visit as an interesting link with cycletracks, walkways and wildlife corridors. A petition to protect this has been opened at https://www.edinburgh.gov.uk/directory_record/700011/save_granton_castle_walled_garden. It takes less than a minute to sign. But hurry, it closes on Aug 25th.
