# **Gustavo Dudamel**

# conductor

Gustavo Dudamel was born in 1981 in Barquisimeto, Venezuela. He studied the violin before turning to conducting in 1993, studying with Rodolfo Saglimbeni and José Antonio Abreu. He started his career as an assistant conductor of the Amadeus Chamber Orchestra, of which he became Music Director in 1996. In 1999 he became Music Director of the Simón Bolívar Youth Orchestra. He came to international attention when he won the inaugural Bamberger Symphoniker Gustav Mahler Competition in 2004. He was Music Director of the Gothenburg Symphony Orchestra (2007-12), of which he is currently Honorary Conductor, and became Music and Artistic Director of the Los Angeles Philharmonic in 2009. A vocal champion of music education and inclusion, in 2007 he founded Youth Orchestra Los Angeles, which provides music education to over 1,200 children annually, and in 2012 he founded the Gustavo Dudamel Foundation to promote access to music as a catalyst for integration and social change. His numerous recordings include Brahms's Fourth Symphony, which won a Grammy Award in 2012, and The John Adams Edition, nominated for a Grammy Award last year. The recipient of numerous international honours, he is a Chevalier de l'Ordre des Arts et des Lettres and in 2013 was named Musical America's Musician of the Year and Gramophone Artist of the Year.

# Los Angeles Philharmonic

The Los Angeles Philharmonic was founded by William Andrews Clark Ir in 1919. Its music directors have included Otto Klemperer (1933-9), Zubin Mehta (1962-78), Carlo Maria Giulini (1978-84), André Previn (1985-9), Esa-Pekka Salonen (1992-2009) and, since 2009, Gustavo Dudamel. The orchestra performs at the Walt Disney Concert Hall, which opened in 2003, and the 18,000-seat Hollywood Bowl, which opened in 1922, and since the 1969 season has toured annually throughout the USA and internationally, particularly to partners in New York, Paris and London, where it is an associate of the Barbican Centre. The Philharmonic creates a variety of festivals. residencies and programmes such as the Green Umbrella new-music series. Among

its wide-ranging learning initiatives is Youth Orchestra Los Angeles (YOLA). which provides free music instruction in deprived neighbourhoods and presents the YOLA National Festival each summer. This centennial season, the orchestra presents an ambitious season featuring over 50 commissioned works; inaugurates the Judith and Thomas L. Beckmen YOLA Center, Inglewood; and mounts Celebrate LA!, a street festival stretching from the Walt Disney Concert Hall to the Hollywood Bowl. The Philharmonic's most recent recordings. including music by John Williams and a box set celebrating the orchestra's centenary, were released in March. It won a Grammy Award in 2011 and an Academy Award in 1974 (for the short film The Bolero).

# **YOLA National**

Through Gustavo Dudamel's Youth Orchestra Los Angeles (YOLA) programme – inspired by Venezuela's revolutionary El Sistema – the Los Angeles Philharmonic and its community partners provide free instruments, intensive music training, and academic support to over 1200 students from vulnerable communities, empowering them to become vital citizens, leaders, and agents of change. YOLA provides each student, from the ages of 6 to 18, with a strong musical and social foundation through participation in 12-15 hours of programming each week.

In 2018 the LA Phil unveiled the architectural design by Gehry Partners, LLC, for its new Judith and Thomas L. Beckmen YOLA Center at Inglewood: the first permanent, purpose-built facility for YOLA.

The LA Phil's YOLA National Institute brings together young musicians from across the Unites States and offers in-depth training and support to those interested in pursuing a career in music. Programme activities include convenings throughout the 2019/20 academic year, mentorship, private instruction, chamber music coaching, travel opportunities, and financial support for college applications. Through this work, the LA Phil aims to empower young people from populations that have been historically excluded from intensive music training and foster a dialogue among practitioners that will help shape the future of the field.
