Summary



After a rise of 7% in 2021, the Student Living Index has fallen by 22% in the UK over 2021, meaning students are better off this year. [1]

Average student incomes have increased by 65%[2] this year, exceeding rising student costs, which are 29%[3] higher than last year.

Edinburgh, Glasgow, Leeds and Canterbury replace London as the regions with the highest student cost of living, while Cardiff offers the best value for money.[1]

- Edinburgh is the only city in the UK where student spend/costs outweigh their income [3,2]
- The lowest, or best, student living index this year goes to Cardiff[1], which moved from the top third of cities in last year's rankings, to achieving best place this year. The city's index halved from 2021 to this year.
- London has seen a drastic improvement in living index over the past year – while Cambridge & Oxford have maintained relative improvements and still rank in the lowest half of our index.[1]





- Edinburgh and Glasgow have seen the highest increase in their indexes compared to the rest of the UK [4] largely due to a lower average monthly income in these regions (students here receive amongst the lowest monthly income). [5]
- London, Bristol, York and Cambridge have all seen great improvements in their positions in the SLI rankings this year. [4]

- Average student monthly rents have fallen 12% this year [6]. This is likely to have been caused by the increased popularity of university accommodation.
- There's been an increase in students living in university accommodation year on year, with more than half now choosing uni accommodation. [7]
- 1 in 3 still choose privately rented accommodation. [7]

- Term time income has increased by 65%[5], whilst costs are further behind at 29% [8] higher than last year, making our index stronger than last year.
- Coventry shoots to the top of the list for income, followed closely by
 Leicester, with Manchester solidifying its gains of the last two years. [5]



Summary: Sources of income



Student loans make up 49% [9] of students' monthly income – however this a slight reduction from 2021, as parents/personal revenue have gained importance in financing student lives this year.

 Less than 1 in 5 students rely on their own income to pay for their rent.[10]

- Scottish students in Edinburgh rely far less heavily on student loans than those at other Scottish unis [11] – which could be linked to tuition fees being free for students from Scotland.
- However, Edinburgh students in 2022 are more reliant on financial support from parents or family than they were last year, with average figures up 19%.
 [12]



Summary: Sources of income

- Students in prestigious universities namely Durham & Bristol – still rely mainly on their parents/family for income (over 50% more than the average). [13]
- Compared to 2021, Oxford & Cambridge are relying less on their parents/family and more on bursaries and scholarship to pay their rent in 2022. [13,14]



- They spend more time on academic study but are more likely to feel stressed as a result. [15,16,17]
 Students in more prestigious universities are more likely to spend more time studying on campus vs. at home compared to the national average [15,16]
- Oxford has the most dedicated students (+53 hours per month studying overall than average, almost two thirds more than the time on campus vs UK average)[15, 16] ...but 34% of students there find studying for their degree highly stressful (compared to 31% UK average) [17]

Students in London rely less on student loans and personal savings than the average, and more on parents/family – this may be a result of having more students living at home in London. [18, 13,19]



Summary: Activities



Time spent on going out and socialising has increased considerably, while more traditional hobbies have taken a step back. [20]

As expected there has been a significant reduction in hours spent studying at home due to the end of lockdown restrictions, down one third year on year. [21]

- Overall, the average time students spend working in a part-time job has doubled since 2021. [21]
- Time spent socialising has increased overall, with all types of socialising increasing by 31 hours a month thanks to the lifting of lockdown restrictions.
 [21,20]



Summary: Activities

- Time and money spent on home entertainment (gaming, video on demand) drastically increased in 2022, with the average time spent achieving a four-fold increase from 2021. [22]
- Students in Newcastle spend the most money on going out. Students here spend an average of 65% more on going out, than the national average.
 [23]
- 42% of all UK students spend £10 or less on self-care and wellbeing (gym, meditation, massage, beauty) – showing this is not a priority within the student population. [24]
- Students in Newcastle, Leicester and Manchester spend the most on selfcare and wellbeing – on average, Newcastle spent over £25 more than the lowest spenders (Cardiff). [24]



Summary: Monthly expenditure



Supermarket spend remains the top monthly cost this year for UK students at an average of £76.29 per month, while spend on household bills has more than doubled since 2021. [25]

 Spending on going out has increased by 63% since 2021, a reflection of COVID restrictions being fully lifted across the UK by mid-way through the academic year. [25]

- Monthly spend on fashion has increased by 39% since 2021. [25]
- This year students in Liverpool spent £30.50 more than the average UK student on alcohol per month, with
 Cambridge students spending the least. [26]
- Oxford students spend the most on takeaways, at £20 more than the UK average. [27]



Summary: Money management



35% of students have found themselves running out of money by end of the term – this is 8 percentage points higher than last year. [28]

- Students in Cambridge are likely to save the most each month (+82% vs UK average). [29]
- Just under 1 in 5 UK students find managing their money stressful [30]
- This is most pronounced in **Coventry**, where stress is 30 percentage points higher than average.
 [30]

- Stress of managing money has increased overall by 4 percentage points year on year. [30]
- More than a third of students find themselves running out of money before the end of the month, up from 25% in 2021. [28]



Summary: Motivations and expectations



The top reason to pick a university is still **subject choice**, however the importance of university fees has grown drastically in 2022. [31]

University reputation and being close to home also continue to be key reasons. [31]

 Canterbury is the university most likely to be chosen for subject choice followed by Glasgow and Cardiff this year [32]

- Leeds has moved to top choice of university chosen for its reputation.
 [33]
- Durham and Oxford rank second and third choice due to reputation. [33]
- Cambridge takes the top spot for university fees as the number one motivator, followed by Coventry and Leicester. [34]



Summary: Wellbeing and sustainability



31% of students rate studying for university as being very stressful, a slight decrease of 12 percentage points YoY. [35]

Glasgow and **Coventry** students had the highest level of stress. [35]

- 36% of students enjoy studying for their degree, which has been a slight increase YoY. It's likely that this is down to more face-to-face lectures and pandemic restrictions lifting. [36]
- Students are most likely to use exercise and sports as stress-coping mechanisms. [37]
- 38% of students said exams taken in summer 2021 were more stressful than expected. [38]



Summary: Cost of Living and the Future



1 in 4 students feel their universities do nothing to help with the cost-ofliving crisis [39]

- Durham had the highest number of students who felt they had no support from their universities at 56% - over 133% up on the UK average. [39]
- Most universities have performed poorly when it comes to supporting students through the cost-of-living.

- 88% of UK students on average have made lifestyle changes to live within their budget. Reducing the number of items bought online is the most widelyadopted change. [40]
- Grocery and food shopping habits have also changed for students,
 with 46% swapping to supermarket
 own-brands [41] and 43% buying fewer
 takeaways. [42]



Summary: Cost of Living and the Future

- 91% of students expect the cost of living to rise further in the next academic year. [43]
- 40% of students expect the cost of living to rise in line with inflation, while 51% expect it to rise at a higher level than inflation. [43]
- When it comes to plans after university, the most popular options considered by students are renting their own living space, and taking an extended holiday or break. [44]
- Exeter students are most likely to plan to rent their own living space after university. [45]
- Cardiff & Glasgow students are most likely to plan to take an extended holiday/break. [46]

Nottingham and York students top the list of those planning to move back in with their parents/guardians after university. [47] This coincides with the fact that these are two of the cities in the UK where students rely more heavily than average on financial support from parents/family. [48]







































Total Monthly Expenditure








Overall spend on going out has almost doubled since 2021.





































































How do you think the pandemic including lack of in-person teaching and social distancing measures have affected your ability to achieve your degree qualification?












