THE TRUE COST OF CHRISTMAS STUDY



We polled more than 3,000 frontline workers. Spanning the UK, Germany, The Netherlands and the Nordics.

Respondents included frontline and non-desk based staff within shipping, distribution, retail, hotel, food services and hospitality.

The impact of inflation



Nearly half of respondents worked more hours this year, than in previous years, as they need extra income to support their family...

41% in the Nordics



29 - 56%...

...said the wages they take home barely cover their living expenses including house costs utilities, transport and food.



Workers in the UK reported to be the worst affected (56%), followed by those in Germany (39%), the Nordics (31%) and The Netherlands (29%)

One in three received a pay rise this year but don't feel better off from it.

Split as 28% of workers in the Netherlands, 29% in Germany, 30% in the Nordics and 31% in the UK

Around a third had to accept financial support from friends and family this year as their wages don't cover living costs. This was highest in The Netherlands - affecting 39% of respondents. Followed by Germany (34%), the Nordics (34%) and the UK (31%).

26% of workers in Germany, The Netherlands and the Nordics had to use food banks this year, and 11% of workers in the UK.



The impact of the holidays...





Half or more of respondents will be getting into debt to celebrate Christmas – using credit cards, loans and borrowing money from friends and family.

58% of workers in the Nordics and 57% in The Netherlands said they'd be getting into debt compared to 51% in the UK and 50% in Germany.



Approximately one third...



...are dreading Christmas this year because of the cost of everything. With workers in the Nordics (32%) most affected followed by the UK (29%) and The Netherlands (26%).

61% of frontliners in Germany don't like working at Christmas because the high workload causes added stress. This affects 44% of staff in the UK, 35% in The Netherlands and 34% in the Nordics.
